1	Day 1 Arrival in Lhasa	 airport - hotel transfer in Lhasa
2	Day 2 Lhasa Potala Palace & Sera Monastery	 breakfast, lunch  Potala Palace (UNESCO), Sera Monastery Standing on top of Red Hill in the north-west of the Lhasa city region, the Potala Palace is a grand Tibetan palace complex that remains the largest and most intact ancient palace in Xizang (Tibet) Autonomous Region today. Behaviours that are taboo in Tibetan Buddhism, such as wearing a hat inside, taking photos and stepping on doorills, should be avoided during any visit. Advance booking is required. This monastery together with Drepung Monastery and Ganden Monastery are jointly known as the “great three monasteries of Lhasa”. This tranquil place has seen a succession of eminent monks and living Buddha give lectures about Buddhist scriptures ever since its completion in 1419. Sera Monastery is particularly known in the Tibetan region for its daily scripture debates, which remain one of its main draws. The monastery has developed its own distinctive style in terms of the level of occasion, code of gestures as well as intensity, and is a fascinating ritual to watch.

3	Day 3 Lhasa Jokhang Temple, Barkhor Street & Norbulingka	 breakfast, lunch  Jokhang Temple (UNESCO), Barkhor Street, Norbulingkha With a history of more than 1,300 years, Jokhang Temple is a Tibetan Buddhist monastery nestled in the old part of Lhasa. Having housed almost all key Buddhist events, the temple is often called the “Eye of Xizang (Tibet) Autonomous Region”. Thanks to its extremely high status in Buddhism, the temple is frequented by pilgrims and worshiped with burning incense all year long. It is circled in a clockwise direction every day by a steady stream of believers who kneel with devotion in front of the main entrance on a stone floor imbued with the marks of the visits of the thousands of pilgrims who have come before them. The Jokhang Temple is located in the Barkhor neighbourhood and the street around the temple is called Barkhor Street, which means “eight corner street”. Initially a normal road around the temple, it has gradually become the route by which many pilgrims circumambulate the monastery in prayer and one of Lhasa’s most important commercial streets. Lined on both sides with shops selling religious wares in various sizes as well as all kinds of daily necessities, it is a fantastic place to shop, try local snacks, and check out the variety of goods on offer. The Norbulingkha is the summer palace of the Dalai Lama.
4	Day 4 Lhasa to Gyantse by Private Car Yamdrok Lake	 private transfer from Lhasa to Gyantse  breakfast, lunch  Yamdruktso Lake The Yamdruktso Lake, one of the three largest sacred lakes in Xizang, will show you beautiful snow-capped mountains and numerous clear streams.
5	Day 5 Gyantse to Shigatse by Private Car Pelkor Chode Monastery	 private transfer from Gyantse to Shigatse  breakfast, lunch  Palkhor Chode Monastery, Gyantse Fortress The Palkhor Choede, a monastery having the characteristics of Han, Xizang and Nepali architecture, is a mixture of different cultures. It enjoys a high status in Xizang Buddhism history. The Gyantse Fortress, also called Gyantse Dzong, offers an outstanding view of the old town and surrounding valleys. It tells a story about the heroic resistance of the Xizang against far superior forces during the British invasion in 1903 -1904.
6	Day 6 Shigatse to Lhasa by Private Car Tashilhunpo Monastery	 private transfer from Shigatse to Lhasa  breakfast, lunch  Tashilhunpo Monastery The Tashilhunpo Monastery is the traditional seat of successive Panchen Lamas and there are nearly 800 lamas in the monastery nowadays.
7	Day 7 Lhasa Departure	 hotel - airport transfer in Lhasa  breakfast

Xizang (Tibet) Travel Permit Guidelines & Booking Process

Essential Permit Guidelines

Mandatory Requirement: All non-Chinese passport holders require a Travel Permit in addition to a valid Chinese Visa to

board flights or trains into Xizang (Tibet).

Authorized Application: Independent permit applications are not accepted; permits must be arranged through an authorized travel agency as part of a fully booked package (including licensed guide, private vehicle, and itinerary).

Application Timeline: Submit your booking and documents at least **25–30 days prior** to departure to ensure smooth processing.

Fixed Itinerary: Destinations, travel dates, and traveler details are locked onto the permit once issued and cannot be altered during travel.

4-Step Easy Booking & Permit Process

Step 1: Confirm Itinerary & Book Tour Package — Select travel dates and finalize private tour arrangements with your travel consultant.

Step 2: Submit Required Travel Documents (30 Days in Advance) — Provide clear digital copies of your passport photo page and valid China Tourist Visa.

Step 3: Agency Applies for Travel Permit — We handle all official regional documentation and verification.

Step 4: Receive Your Original Permit — The original permit will be delivered to our local office in your departure city for pickup. If you have booked local land services in that city, our guide will hand the permit to you in person before your departure.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q: How far in advance do I need to book to get the Travel Permit for Xizang (Tibet)?

A: Please book your tour and provide your passport and China visa copies at least 25 to 30 days before your travel date to ensure sufficient processing time.

Q: How does altitude acclimatization work on this tour?

A: Day 1 is kept free of strenuous activities to help you acclimatize to Lhasa's altitude (3,650m). Drink plenty of water, avoid intense exertion on the first two days, and pack warm layers.

Q: Can you issue a Travel Permit without booking a tour?

A: No. Under regional tourism regulations, Travel Permits for Xizang (Tibet) are never issued as standalone documents; they must be tied to a confirmed tour package with licensed local guides and private transfers.

Q: How do I receive my physical permit before entering Xizang (Tibet)?

A: The original permit will be delivered to our local office in your departure city, where you can pick it up prior to boarding your flight or train. If you have booked land services with us in that departure city, our local guide will deliver the permit to you directly.
